After reading this story, I have some thoughts about it and I'm going to review the story from my point of view.

First, this story has a typical structure like any ordinary stories. The opening is about the background information of Charlie. It is where we find that music is his life.

Next comes the build-up and the problem of the story: Charlie has to choose between two beautiful women who have fallen in love with him. One of the women is incredibly talented in music and can sound like singing even when she is just talking. In contrast, the other woman doesn't like music and would get bored easily when Charlie talks to her about music. Lastly, I would like to comment on what I've been inspired by the story. This story reflects the most realistic side of human beings — we choose money over other important things, even when it comes to choosing your lifelong partner. Should we choose someone who shares a similar interest or someone who is rich? Also, it

describes a common life experience --- we have to make decisions throughout our life, from little things like choosing what to eat to big deals such as life or justice.

What's more, if I were Charlie, I would choose neither of them. Maybe both of them aren't the one I am meant to find in life. I have analysed the possible outcomes for choosing either of them. The rich woman would most likely leave Charlie one day because they share opposite ideas, and the poor woman would probably make Charlie's life worse than before since she is so poor that they can hardly survive together.
