

The Elephant Foundation Maasai Warrior School Visit

On 23 November 2023, The Elephant Foundation (TEF), a Hong Kong-based organization dedicated to conservation education and projects, visited our school. As part of their annual Elephant Week, they brought Maasai Warrior Daniel Ole Sambu from Kenya. The Elephant Foundation's school visit program aims to educate students about global issues that hinder international wildlife conservation efforts. It focuses on raising awareness of African conservation efforts and how our actions in Hong Kong impact wildlife abroad.

English Ambassadors attended a talk hosted by Daniel, an elder in the Maasai community and head of the predator compensation fund at the Big Life Foundation. They learned about human-wildlife conflict and the importance of wildlife conservation in Africa.
