### Take a hike:

Hong Kong is a hiker's paradise and there are many trails to explore. Check out the 4-hour walk on the Dragon's Back Hiking Trail on Hong Kong Island or the Tai Mei Tuk (Plover Cove) trails if you're looking for an easy walk under 3km. If you're up for a bigger challenge, check out Tap Mun (Grass Island) or the Olympic Trail (Lantau).

#### Picnic time:

Pack a bag with a blanket, your favourite snacks and games and head out to one of the city's many parks for a picnic with friends. If you'd like a patch of grass to chill out on, try Tamar Park (Admiralty) or the Kai Tak Rooftop Park (Kowloon).

#### Hot off the grill

There are loads of barbeque spots all over Hong Kong. For a park BBQ, visit Lion Rock Park (Wong Tai Sin) or make it a beach BBQ at Shek O or Deep Water Bay.



#### Fun in the sun:

Hong Kong has great beaches and swimming pools. If swimming is not your thing but you'd still like to cool down this summer, be sure to visit the water play area at the Kai Tak Cruise Terminal (Kowloon).

## Under \$100

#### A view from above:

If you haven't been on the Hong Kong Observation Wheel (Central Waterfront), this holiday is the ideal opportunity to check out your city from above. Try to go on a clear day for awesome views of Victoria Harbour, Kowloon and Hong Kong Island.

Entrance: \$70 per person (student rates)

#### Like a fish in water:

Except for the many beaches and swimming pools on Hong Kong Island, the city also has a water park at the Tseung Kwan O swimming pool. With five slides and eight pools to choose from, you'll be able to spend the entire day here.

Entrance: \$9 per person (student rates)

#### Singing in the rain:

We know that not all summer days in Hong Kong are sunny, but there's no excuse to stay home.

Round up a group of friends and head to your nearest Karaoke venue for a fun day indoors.

Entrance: Depends on the venue and time slot.

### **Keep it cool:**

Ice skating is another great activity for a rainy or sweltering summer day. There are two rinks to choose from - Glacier at Festival Walk and Ice Palace at Taikoo City Plaza.

Entrance: \$55 per person (weekday rates)

## Under \$200

### Mind warp:

The Repulse Bay Visual Art Museum is the biggest 3D museum in Hong Kong and gives you the chance to interact with the artworks and even become part of an artwork. With over 80 3D artworks and six different zones, you'll be able to spend an entire day here.

Entrance: \$144 per person (adult rates)

### Jump around:

If you've got some excess energy to get rid of, make sure you visit the Ryze Ultimate Trampoline Park (Java Road, Quarry Bay). The park offers open jumping areas, trampoline dodgeball, basketball hoops and loads more. Entrance: \$150 per hour (adult rates)

## Over \$200

#### **Skate away:**

Did you know Hong Kong has an indoor skate park? Check out the Vans SK85IVE2 Indoor Skate Park in Kwun Tong for some action packed

Entrance: \$300 for a one year membership and \$80 for 2 hours

### Discover your inner child:

Ocean Park and Hong Kong Disneyland are timeless Hong Kong favourites. If you haven't been there for a while, why not rediscover these places during the summer holiday?

Entrance: Ocean Park \$345 Hong Kong Disneyland \$499

## A trip to Hong Kong

I have some suggestions for your trip to Hong Kong. First, if you want bargain shopping, it's a good idea to go to Stanley Market and the Ladies Market. Stanley Market has a wide variety of stalls selling Hong Kong souvenirs and clothes – particularly traditional Chinese dresses and silk garments, toys, luggage bags, ornaments, Chinese arts and crafts. In the Ladies Market, there are stalls selling merchandise at a cheap price.

Then if you want to see nature such as beaches, animals and trees, I recommend you visit Hong Kong Wetland Park and Mai Po Marshes Nature Reserve. In recent years, Mai Po Marshes

has housed over 5,500 migrating birds, including Saunder's Gull and a quarter of the world's Black-faced Spoonbill population. Also, in the Hong Kong Wetland Park, there are different kinds of facilities.

Hong Kong also has different sorts of local delicacies. I suggest you try two special dishes which are on the must-try list in HK. Siu mai are small steamed dumplings with pork or prawns inside, wrapped in a thin white wheat wrapper. They usually have crab roe and mushroom on the top. Barbecue meat like Cantonese

roasted pork is also recommended. This meat is usually served with a bun, rice or noodles.

Finally, Hong Kong has some other good places to visit. If you want to see the local heritage, it's great to visit the Kowloon Walled City Park. It features some scenic landscaping and a fully restored Yamen as the centerpiece in the park. You can take some pictures there. Tai O Fishing Village is a village that has some stilt houses. After sightseeing there, you can eat some seafood and buy traditional food like salted fish and shrimp paste. I hope you will have an unforgettable experience exploring Hong Kong.

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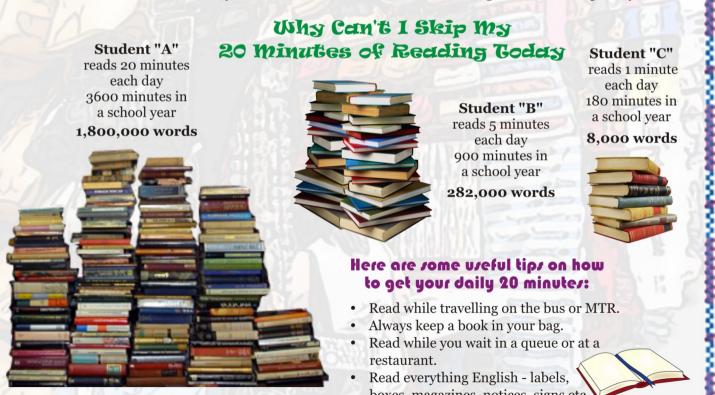

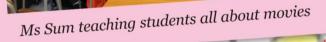
